How to make payment for voluntary contributions:

Once your child's subjects are confirmed for 2022 in mid November, information about how you use the Compass parent portal to make voluntary contributions will be provided to you via email.

BYOD (Bring your own device) Program

As a school we focus on the use of digital technologies to enhance the teaching and learning environment for both students and teachers at Mac.Rob. Our aim is for every student to have a personal device that they bring to school on the first day and every day thereafter.

If you have a laptop or tablet, we highly recommend that you bring these devices to Mac.Rob. There are specific requirements for hardware and software, but generally any device purchased within the last 3 years should be suitable provided it meets the following requirements:

- Has an external keyboard
- Is able to run Google Chrome
- Has a battery that would last a full school day
- Device needs to support 5ghz band for wireless connection
- Is ergonomic (e.g. is portable and sturdy, ergonomic to use over a period of time)

Other educational items for students to own A list of items (eg. books and resources) that the school recommends you purchase for your child to individually own and use will be provided to you by Campion Education via Mac.Rob Student and Parent Portals in late November.



Financial Support for Families

- State Schools' Relief: A not-for-profit organisation that improves the lives of disadvantaged Victorian students and families. The program covers costs for uniforms, shoes, books and more. Applications are managed and processed by the school.

FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the standard curriculum requirements in Victorian Curriculum F-10, VCE and VCAL.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.

PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:



Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

• Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

 Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.
